

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
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RANTHAMBORE Adventures on Tiger Safaris

Tyger Tyger, burning bright, In the forests of the night; What immortal hand or eye, Could frame thy fearful symmetry?


The world's most loved and photographed tigress had made it her home. Machali, that brave and beautiful wild cat, refused to be intimidated by a 14-foot-long crocodile, he of the pearly teeth and jaws of death. For hours the deadly battle raged between the two—one of the wild world's most fearsome predators on water and land, and the other, the apex predator of the Indian jungles. Her mighty triumph over the croc has long passed into jungle legend.

Wildlife

For over a decade this ferocious tigress, with her high-octane personality, ruled Ranthambore National Park as queen. What gave her name was the unique fish-like mark on the left ear of her face. "Lady of the Lake," or "Crocodile Killer" as she was also known, left for the heavenly hunting grounds on 18th August 2016. Machali's death at age 20, made her the world's oldest-surviving tigress in the wild. Did you know that the government had even launched a commemorative postal cover and stamp to honour Machali for her ecological and economical contributions.

It is jungle folklore such as Machali's fascinating stories which make Ranthambore National Park, a huge draw for visitors from all over the world. Straddling the junction of the Aravali and Vindhya hill ranges, Ranthambore National Park is one of India's premier tiger-spotting destinations. Its unique geographic setting offers some of the most thrilling wildlife experiences you could hope for.

Ranthambhore has a rich and bio- diverse setting, supporting both the tiger and his natural prey in great numbers. Its lazy sprawl over 400 sq km, and if combined with the area of Sawai Man Singh Sanctuary area, is around 500 sq km. The jungles here once served as the private hunting preserve of the Maharajas of the princely state of Jaipur. With hunting officially long banned now you can only hunt the tigers and other wildlife denizens of the park by camera. Today thousands of wildlife enthusiasts from the world over



have immersed themselves in this glorious wilderness and returned home with their own unique stories and photographs.

Kings and commoners, presidents and chieftains all have marvelled over the fabulous wealth of faunal and botanical splendour of this game park. Tiger sightings are the big lure, but Ranthambore is also a magnet for birding enthusiasts.

Scattered across the game park are ancient structures and water bodies which also draw the attention of the visitors. The Ranthambore Fort, dating to the 10th century, three lakes and an ancient temple punctuate the luxuriant verdure of the park.

Jogi Mahal, nestled by the Padma Talao in Zone 3 of Ranthambore National Park, once served as a hunting lodge for the Jaipur royals. It was transformed into a forest rest house many years ago and accommodated visitors like the former Indian Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi, Bill Clinton, and Amitabh Bachchan, when they were touring the park. Another landmark site here is the massive banyan tree purportedly the second largest banyan tree in India. Padma Talao is also a great spot for birdwatching.

The Ranthambore Fort, located on the outskirts of the park, is a vivid reminder of a fierce battle fought between Raja Hameer Dev Chauhan and Delhi sultan Ala-ud-din Khilji in 1301. After a long siege, the defenders of Ranthambhore, ancient Ranastambhapura, suffered from a famine and defections of some of Hameer's own generals. Raja Hameer (a direct descendant of Rajasthan's legendary Prithviraj Chauhan) and his loyal forces fought to the death. The female contingent of his family collectively committed Jauhar (mass self-immolation) rather than be taken prisoner. Khilji ultimately took over the hill fort and left Ulugh Khan behind as its governor.

The fortress is awash with old palaces, royal court, temples, chhatris bazaars, and water bodies. Largely in ruins– the structures serve as an evocative reminder of a Ranthambore that defied the growing greed of the Delhi sultanate to gobble up more territories in Rajasthan and neighbouring Gujarat.

Located within the precincts of Ranthambore Fort is the **Trinetra Ganesh Temple**, a huge attraction for local devotees. Dating back to the year 1299, it is believed to be one of Rajasthan's oldest temples. What's unique about it also is that enshrined here is a three-eyed Lord Ganesh, along with his entire family which includes his two wives Riddhi and Siddhi and two sons Shubh and Labh. It becomes a hive of activity during the Ganesh Chaturthi celebrations.

Tiger Safaris

A 6-seater vehicle, open from all sides, a gypsy in Ranthambore is available for morning and evening safaris. There are 10 eco-tourism zones in Ranthambore, and a jeep safari is allowed in each of them.

Jeep Safari Bookings Being one of India's most popular tiger parks, safari bookings (available online on https:// fmdss.forest.rajasthan.gov.in/) should be made well ahead.

Birding excursions

Ranthambore is a huge attraction for birding enthusiasts. Arrive here with binocs and bird book for a truly immersive experience. The **Padma Talao**, the lotus fille waterbody is an excellent spot for bird watching. **Malik Talao** may be small but it is an alluring spot for birdlife. Get your fill of waterfowl and keep your eyes peeled for sightings of **marsh crocodiles** who visit frequently.

Established in1955 as the Sawai Madhopur Game Sanctuary by the government it was brought under Project Tiger in 1973 as one of India's top Tiger Reserves. By 1980 Ranthambhore had also gained the status of a National Park. In 1991 it came to include the adjoining expanses of the Sawai Man Singh and Keladevi sanctuaries.



Other attractions *Dastkar Ranthambore*

Find your way to a popular artisan hub in Swai Madhopur— this is Dastkar Ranthambore, where you can have a leisurely browse of local crafts. Do your bit for the economy of the local community. The

Ranthambore School of Art

The Ranthambore School of Art, located on Ranthambhore Road, is a treat for wildlife buffs. Marvel over the creations of local artists who have on display some superb paintings and artworks of tigers and other denizens of the forests at Ranthambhore.

Rajiv Gandhi Regional Museum of Natural History

Located 9km away from Swai Madhopur, Ramsinghpura village is home to the Rajiv Gandhi Regional Museum of Natural History. Steep yourself in the astonishing wilderness heritage of the biodiversity of India's western region. On display are rare plants, animals, and geological specimens The aim of the museum was to put the spotlight on the critical need to conserve the region's unique flora and fauna.


It has also more vigorously put the spotlight on the growing menace of depletion or in more severe cases, extinction, of several species of flora and fauna due to various causes.

A Tryst with Some leading Eco-friendly Destinations in India

CORBETT NATIONAL PARK

Located in Uttarakhand it was the first wildlife reserve of India, to come under the international Project Tiger, with the aim to protect the Royal Bengal Tiger, whose numbers were diminishing rapidly, thanks to hunting and poaching and loss of habitat. Corbett National Park was one of the nine tiger reserves created at the launch of the Project Tiger in 1973. The park is home to over 50 species of mammals including the elephant, leopards, wild boar, sambar and Himalayan black bear. Over 110 species of trees and 51 species of shrubs can be found in Corbett in addition to a stunning array of insect life.

Apart from tiger and elephant spotting, one can also enjoy birdwatching and angling. Strict rules are in place for visitors to behave in a responsible manner while visiting the park. No littering, loud music, harassing animals, breaking flowers or uprooting plants from the forest— these are just basic givens for an eco-friendly safari. The number of safaris is monitored and only permitted along tourist designated routes, so as not to disturb the animals in this beautiful natural habitat.



KAZIRANGA NATIONAL PARK

This superb wildlife habitat has played a pivotal role in the conservation of the endangered great Indian one-horned rhino which was nearing extinction. The remarkable turn-around has been recognised with the UNESCO tag. This is Assam's oldest



game park and can be found at Golaghat along the southern bank of the Brahmaputra River in Nagaon district. You can enjoy some wonderful jeep safaris spotting other denizens such as another endangered species, the barasingha, hunted down mercilessly for its magnificent horns, back in the day till the government put a ban on hunting. Keep your eyes peeled for families of elephant and the dangerous Asiatic buffalo who have also made this beautiful game park their home.

Gir National Park and Wild Ass Sanctuary

Two Indian endangered animal species can be found in the protected environs of Gujarat's game parks. The Asiatic lion, which once had a home in many of the country's jungles, lost the battle to the hunters' guns. Now you can only see this magnificent 'king of the jungle' at Gir National Park, and only on a jeep safari

Just 150 km away from Ahmedabad in the Little Rann of Kutch lies the Wild Ass Sanctuary. This UNESCO-acclaimed site is also the



protected habitat of the last remaining population of the Indian Wild Ass, a critically endangered species. It's also the world's last population of the khur sub-species of the wild ass. One of the fastest Indian mammals, it can reach speeds of 70-80 kmph and even outrun a jeep!

Also, a popular birding site, the sanctuary is home to over 350 different species of birds, including the common crane, pelican and the lesser flamingo. On a visit here you will enjoy some unique experiences intermingling with some of the ethnic groups and local tribes who have made the unique region of the Rann their home. Discover the charms and cultural richness of the Kolis, Rabaris, Bajanias, Kutchis, Gujjars and the Bharvads who live here.

GAHIRMATHA MARINE SANCTUARY

The state of Odisha offers many thrilling experiences for the eco-friendly tourist. One of the most unique encounters one may enjoy here is a boat ride to the nesting and breeding site of the unique Olive Ridley turtles. The Dangamal Conservation Project at the Bhitarkanika Sanctuary offers a window to the unique world of the saltwater crocodile.



Located in Kendrapara district in the state of Odisha, the Gahirmatha Marine Sanctuary has been playing a critical role in the conservation of the endangered Olive Ridley Turtle. Spread across 672 sq km, Gahirmatha is one of the world's most important and largest nesting and breeding sites for the Olive Ridleys. Olive Ridleys travel for thousands of nautical miles across the Bay of Bengal to arrive at the seaboard of the Bhitarkanika Sanctuary, the entry point to the Gahirmatha Marine Sanctuary.

Strict vigilance by the forest department has ensured the protection of this site by monitoring the number of tourists who are permitted to travel by boat to witness this unique phenomenon. Visitors also get to travel through these waterways located in this estuarine deltaic region, which is served by the confluence of three rivers — the Brahmani, Baitarani and Dhamra. The site is fabled for its amazing mangrove habitat which itself is rich in a unique range of marine life. A wonderful bonus for the eco-friendly traveller indeed!

Another bonus is the Bhitarkanika Sanctuary itself which is the subcontinent's biggest sanctuary space for the endangered saltwater crocodile.

PERIYAR TIGER RESERVE

Located in the lush and verdant environs of the Western Ghats, Periyar Tiger Reserve is one of the country's oldest protected habitats. On offer are several eco-tourism activities at the game park— wonderful treks, boating, a Night Patrol trek with the forest guards and, for the more fit, the Tiger Trail Trek Package— which includes camping in the



forest for a night or two with armed guards. Also known as Thekkady the game park was declared both a Tiger Reserve and National Park by 1982.

By availing any of these community-based ecotourism programmes you will be directly helping in the empowerment of forest dependent communities which will in turn reduce their forest dependence and help in the conservation of the park and the tigers. You will also, thus be contributing in your personal way towards the conservation of Periyar Tiger Reserve.

Donate and promote these conservation efforts and initiatives

- To restore and save the habitat and Ecosystem and thereby protect the endangered wildlife
- To strengthen and disseminate conservation education awareness to a broader community
- To promote wildlife conservation-oriented research projects and to strengthen facilities for protection
- To support the livelihood of Forest Dependent Communities

Tourism



HEMIS NATIONAL PARK

If you are travelling to Ladakh, do plan a visit to the beautiful Hemis National Park renowned for its exceptional conservation programme for saving the endangered snow leopard. What makes your visit even more meaningful, as well as the local people, is staying at one of the homestays, which is an intrinsic part of helping support the local economy. This initiative has been designed to use tourism as a conservation tool for the preservation of snow leopards and their ecosystem. Himalayan Homestays champion tourism with a difference, proposing village-based experiences that uphold and share traditional ways of life in the high Himalayas. Established in picturesque villages across Ladakh and Zanskar, these homestays give you the opportunity to immerse yourself in an authentic, eco-friendly and socially responsible manner.

Only 5000-7000 snow leopards are left in the wild! You can help save the snow leopards by donating to specific projects. Your donation helps fund Snow Leopard Research and Conservation Projects. With your help, the work will continue to improve the livelihoods of people who share their mountain habitat with these magnificent cats.

MAWLYNNONG VILLAGE

Located in the misty highlands of Meghalaya, Mawlynnong Village in the East Khasi Hills has gained world fame as a prime example of how cleanliness is next to godliness. UNESCO has acclaimed Mawlynnong as Asia's cleanest village. The village is also renowned for its astounding living



root bridges. The Nohwet Living Root Bridge was formed by weaving the roots of the Ficus Elastica tree around a bamboo framework. The upkeep of this tradition has been a much-venerated activity with the local community down the ages. For the unaware living root bridges are an essential component of traditional Khasi traditional architecture as the village communities relied extensively upon them to navigate the steep valleys and mountains. There are several homestays in the village which serve as a base for exploring local culture and the gorgeous surrounds. Mawlynnong also enjoys 90% literacy and a local community that has a good understanding of how a high civic sense can promote cleanliness and keep you healthy.



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Tourism

The United Nations and World Tourism Organisation saw fit to declare the year 2002 as the International Year of Ecotourism. Ecotourism serves as a critical tool and springboard for the conservation of nature and sustainable development. Sustainable development of tourism is also critical for accruing benefits for the local community, socially, economically, and ecologically.

The Indian government has set in place rigorous guidelines to serve this cause, and the growing championing of responsible tourism is closely intertwined with the foreseeable future of this critical component of the tourism landscape.

As identified by the World Economic Forum: "leading hospitality players have embraced the environmental, social and governance (ESG) model and are committed to reducing their carbon footprint. They are also working toward reducing the impact of their buildings by retrofitting old ones and imposing stricter environmental rules on developers, architects, designers and engineers, using certifications such as LEED or BREEAM.

For almost 20 years, these companies have given guidance and regulations to their assets to develop a more sustainable approach to their operations, from renewable energy, energy efficiency and water conservation, to local employment and supporting cultural heritage. They have developed their own corporate responsibility measurement platforms and most hotel management companies have set up science-based targets (SBTi) for 2030."

Holidaymakers are increasingly making informed choices to spend their leisure time in a more meaningful Earth-friendly way. There is a growing understanding of the need to conduct oneself in a responsible manner while travelling through ecologically-sensitive areas. Leading by example one can show others, not so like-minded, how to sensitize themselves to the importance and need for conservation of flora and fauna. It also means respecting the local community and its rootedness in preserving the natural environs around their village settlements.

You too can contribute in some small way with the knowledge that responsible tourism practices can drive the process of conservation to reduce ecological threats such as protecting wildlife and the forest.

Top ten tips for eco-tourists

- Visit destinations which have conservation value, such as protected areas, World Heritage sites or areas where nature and culture is a key attraction. Include in your trip visits and activities related to conservation projects. Or take this a step further and plan a "doing" holiday! Many organizations plan expeditions where you can spend time working on a local conservation project.
- 2. Travel light: limit the packaging you bring with you. This will become waste in your holiday destination.
- Before you travel, learn as much as possible about your destination, about the natural assets, the local people and their culture and any environmental concerns (for example if there is a drought, if forest fires are a major threat ..). This should help to make your journey more enjoyable!
- 4. Use reputable local tour operators, preferably those who contribute to conservation themselves. Aim to follow any local codes, for example regarding behaviour or dress if visiting cultural or sacred natural sites.
- 5. Pick nature-friendly accommodation: ask hotels if they are truly eco, for example do they have an environmental policy? Have they implemented energy and water saving measures? Do they contribute to local conservation efforts and support local communities?
- If you can, try to get to your destination by train or coach

 you'll see more of the country you're travelling in as well
 as reducing your carbon emissions.
- 7. When you're on holiday, choose wisely what you put on your plate. Choose locally sourced produce that's in season and be aware that certain Endangered species may be on the menu without your knowledge - ask local conservation organizations for a list of what to look out for.
- Many wild plants and animals are in great danger ... you can contribute to protecting them by avoiding buying souvenirs made from Endangered species (jewellery made from red coral and turtle carapace, shatoosh and many others). Be careful if you're bringing plants or seeds back from your travels – check that they couldn't become invasive species.
- 9. Wildlife watching can be an incredible experience... but don't disturb wildlife, for your own safety and theirs!
- 10. Maintain a relationship with your new friends in the destination, become a member of local conservation organizations.

hile vacations can be exciting for you it can be very taxing for your furry companion. Both ways – whether you travel with your pet or leave him behind. It's important to understand about the Do's & Don't that you need to follow to make your pet comfortable in either situation.

Planning a vacation with your Pet

Most pets do not like to be out of their safe and cozy home environment or, for that matter, even break their daily routine. So, here are a few pointers for how you can enjoy a holiday accompanied by your pet.

Enjoying the journey

Start training your pets for road trips in their early life to condition them to not get car sick, nervous or anxious. This can be done by taking them on small joy rides with you occasionally. Doing this gets pets accustomed to being in a vehicle and associating the ride with fun and companionship with a loved master/ mistress.

If you are planning a long trip with your pets the arrangements need to also cater to their comfort rather than just yours alone.

Your pet should recognize his car and get familiar with his designated place in the car on the journey. Give him the right and comfortable place to sit, although he may wish to explore other seating places during the journey—after all he's not a windup toy. Needless to say, the vehicle should be comfortable with enough space for your pet. Avoid jerks as much as possible during the road journey; think you are travelling with a baby and how it could get hurt.

How long do you plan on driving at a stretch?

Make it short may be 3-4 hours at a go. Get out of the vehicle with your pet. Ensure there are no strays around when you take a break otherwise it can be counterproductive. Also ensure that the place is not too crowded to avoid creating any stress for your pet.

Take time to stretch your legs, let him also walk around a bit and ease himself, before continuing your journey. A small treat during the break and a drink of water should ease any residue anxiety.

Preparations before travel

Make sure to stock up on pet food, at least two sets of leash and collar, feeding and water bowls, clothes and bedding as the season demands. pet's favourite toys to keep him out of mischief.

Some tasty treats will be useful.

Give a light dose of anti-vomit medicine an hour before travel to avoid motion sickness. Give it very light food before you take off. Take your pet on a small walk before getting him into the vehicle to work off his energy so he can settle down. Offer water along the journey often to prevent dehydration.

Planning a stay

When planning your accommodations for your holiday it makes sense to choose a pet-friendly hotel or homestay. It should have enough open space where your pet can enjoy himself as well. A small private open area outside your cottage would be wonderful. It's lovely to have hotel staff who are at ease with pets.

Avoid letting your pet mingle with other dogs to prevent accidents and infection. Be alert for monkeys if they are around. They carry rabies.

Don't leave your pet alone when you go out as it can be very stressful.

Rather than a walled in restaurant opt for an outdoor space for a meal so that your pet is comfortable.

Leaving your pet behind while you travel

It's the worst thing your pets would like but life has compulsions and you cannot always travel with them. Make sure your pet is comfortable while you are away, even though he's bound to pine for you till your return.

Try to accommodate the pet in his familiar place. As far as possible try to keep him either at home with an attendant or with a relative/friend known to him.

Keep the pet's feeding and water bowl, toys, clothing etc. with him while you are away. Ensure that whoever is taking care of him follows the routine feeding pattern, food type and walks. Let your pet visit his familiar spots while on a walk.

Someone should always be around the pet; do not leave it unattended to keep him calm.

Choosing a boarding

It's not feasible every time to keep the pet at your friend's place when you are away, making it necessary to opt for the right boarding facility.

The pet should be accustomed to boarding from an early age once he becomes an adult. It's preferable to keep him, if possible, at the same boarding facility each time. Start boarding your pet with a short time duration (1-2 days) and gradually increase it to more days. With this practice he will have soaked in the feeling that he will not be abandoned and his parents will come back.

Keep all his toys and utensils with him to get a homey feel.

Feed the same food that he is familiar with. Some delicacies may be added to pamper him.

Ensure that boarding follows strict hygiene and comfort conditions required for pets.

Your pet should not be housed with unvaccinated, sick and aggressive dogs.

There should be a proper play area in the boarding facility.

The boarding staff should be friendly and walk and play routine should be followed.



DALHOUSIE... Through My Eyes

Author Dr Kiran Chadha shares her fascination about the hill town and its deep connection with her family roots

What inspired you to write a book specifically about Dalhousie? Was there a defining moment that led you to embark on this journey?

The sudden death of my loving husband H.R. Chadha (IPS) in January 2015 shattered me completely. However, my positive persona and complete faith in God Almighty, and destiny helped me recover to engage myself in some mental activity. So, the research for this book began in the summer of the same year, 2015.

I had also realized that while there are many books on Chamba, there is little to read about Dalhousie and its development since it was founded. Connected with this was the urge to delve into the history of my own family of Plahas. They had moved into Dalhousie in 1880, within 20 years of the founding of the hill station, and would live there for seven months a year.

I have spent two years in research talking to many old residents and many hours about my great fascination for Dalhousie.

Can you share a brief overview of the book and what readers can expect from Dalhousie...through my eyes?

Dalhousie... through my eyes is a slice of the pictorial history of almost two centuries. Spread over five hills, Dalhousie with tall pine trees, lush green meadows surrounded by snow-clad mountains in the mesmerizing Himalayas is my home town. After traversing the world, I have settled here. I have my roots here. I dwell here amongst its cool breezes, the torrential rains, the rainbow encircling





horizons, the mystical colours of the sunset vales— in all the familiar aspects of Dalhousie.

The book is a pictorial history of this magical hill town. The readers will get a glimpse of Dalhousie, its history and historical sites, some old British-style cottages, institutional marvels, the schools of eminence, the churches of the Raj era and the tourist spots to visit. The book contains information on the heritage hotels and the new ones as well. It has information on the famous personalities who came to Dalhousie to paint, write and recover in its salubrious surroundings.

The first edition was a coffee table version, but with the support of Author s Point and Raaj Verma we have published a smaller version for the discerning tourists.

Were there any lesser-known or surprising aspects of Dalhousie that you discovered while working on the book?

I had the privilege of access to Cantonment records, thanks to the fact that I belong to Dalhousie. So, the historical



facts are facts, not fiction. The bungalows I have mentioned are laced with real anecdotes and the readers will be fascinated to read them.


It has also covered the aspect of Partition. India almost lost Dalhousie to Pakistan. Some incidents are straight from the horse's mouth!!!

Tell us more about your family's connection with Dalhousie. Do you have

any favourite memories or spots in the town that hold special meaning for you?

My forefathers were invited by the Britishers to set up a timber and bricks business. We have been there since 1880, just 20 years after the seven hills of Dalhousie were bought up by the Britishers from the Raja of Chamba. In fact, no auction was complete until my great-great grandfather Hiralal participated in it.

Personally, I love revisiting my ancestral village, Surkhigala, and my school and college - Sacred Heart.

Our own cottage built in Bakrota is a beautiful spot in the verdant hills of Dalhousie. The snow-capped mountains, the radiating warmth of the sun, the clear blue sky give me a hangover when I leave Dalhousie in winters. To look at the full moon from my window is sheer magic. And Dalhousie is where I write my poetry.

The title Dalhousie... through my eyes suggests a personal narrative. How much of the book is influenced by your own experiences compared to historical or cultural research?

Indeed, the entire book is a personal journey when I met the local people to find ways to improve Dalhousie. Research and history apart, the book is ridden with my own perspective of the hill station.

Dalhousie has a rich colonial history. How did you balance its historical as-

pects with the modern-day charm of the town in your book?

The rich colonial history is visible through the houses, schools, institutes and churches. Modern day construction is not able to keep up with its architectural past. However, the heritage properties, as well as the new hotels, are geared for all the comforts for the tourists.

I do wish more could be done to retain the charm of this mesmerising hill town. I refer to the water scarcity and garbage disposal in particular. Dalhousie could easily be developed as an adventure sports spot with gondola rides, hiking and a golf course.

What message or feeling do you hope readers will take away after reading Dalhousie...through my eyes?

Well, I know and hope many more people will buy the book to learn about the heritage and history of this quaint hill town. I hope the administration will look into the points raised in the book.

If you had to describe Dalhousie in three words, what would they be and why?

Lush green Dalhousie
 Heritage and history
 Pollution-free

What advice would you give to aspiring writers looking to explore travel writing or memoirs of specific places?

History of any town may be explored by those who have a feel of the place and a personal angle. Writers must meet the locals to delve into the folklore, music, food and flavour of the town or city. Historical buildings too. Research must start from its founding to how it looks now. Suggestions to improve is also a requisite. Some stories of interest and good quality of photos will add to the value of any book.

Sustain your routine to be fit as a fiddle on your trek

Backpacked for your next trek? Here are a few things to keep in mind to have a stress-free adventure.

Strength and Stamina, Flexibility, Stretching and Breathing are the four pillars of a stress-free hike. Trekking grades hinge on components such as length, duration, altitude, type of trail, the gradient, and average hours of trekking on a single day.

Strength and Stamina

Legs, core and shoulders are the main body parts which require the most attention when you start building up your strength and stamina for a trek.

Your pre-trek prep should also include meditation/or any mindfulness practices to help calm your mind and ramp up your mental strength.

Being physically fit and mentally alert, by building leg strength (think-thighs, glutes and knees), stepping up one's cardiovascular endurance, and strengthening your core (with planks and hip raises), is something even the most prolific trekker is adept at, to enjoy a comfortable and good trekking/hiking experience.

Flexibility

Flexibility refers to enjoying unrestricted movement of muscles and joints. It plays an important role while travelling and hiking as it helps to face challenging terrains with confidence and reduces the risk of injuries. It also provides better coordination and the correct posture which helps facilitate climbing for



longer periods with less strain on the muscles and joints.

Focus on flexibility and breathing to make your steps along the trail much smoother and less laborious. The advantages of flexibility include improved performance in physical activities, helping joints in full range of motion, reduction in risk of injury, increased flow of blood and ease of carrying out day to day activities.

Stretching

Did you know stretching before and after trekking is important? Stretching is essential for improving flexibility and mobility of the joints. Stretching before and after hiking can prevent muscle fatigue, soreness and tension. Stretching reduces muscle stiffness. These stretching exercises can be easily done at home.

Before beginning stretching, the body must be warmed up. The best stretching exercises include knees to chest stretch, hamstring floor stretch, spinal stretch, piriformis stretch and seated hip stretch.

Breathing

Similarly, breathing is also an essential component of trekking and hiking. Practicing deep breathing as part of your daily routine improves your ability to cope with stress, anxiety and muscle tension.

Breathing helps to maintain one's pace and increases stamina while walking on varied terrains. It also helps in improving one's endurance to walk longer on the trail.

Staying Ahead

Even the most experienced trekkers go into the groove at least a month ahead before hitting the trail for a trekking adventure.

The key to trek training is all about discovering your own pace as a stepping stone to ramping up your fitness and strength from there.

And when you walk, while body strength training, do it with a backpack to get the feel of the real thing! The other important thing to keep in mind is to choose a grade of trek according to your current level of fitness— to really enjoy your adventure.

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
